

# Club Road Running Championship Rules – 2026

## 2026 Club Road Running Championship Prizes and Rules

The following competitions will be held in 2026:

### **1) Men's and Ladies' "Open" Championship Prizes (Perpetual Trophy)**

### **2) Men's and Ladies' "Veteran" Championship Prizes (Perpetual Trophy)**

*(The "Veteran" championship starts from V40)*

### **3) Men's and Ladies' "U20" Championship Prizes (Perpetual Trophy)**

Points for each race calculated as follows:

1st Harrier – 100 points, 2nd Harrier – 99 points, 3rd Harrier – 98 points... 100th Harrier – 1 point!

5 extra points for designated Cheshire Road Grand Prix and Macclesfield Running Festival races (ie 1st Harrier – 105 points, 2nd Harrier – 104 points, 3rd Harrier – 103 points, etc.)

Your time will be Chip Time where available. (If chip time is the same then better gun time and/or race position will determine order)

Up to 3 marathon results may submitted. Points for each marathon calculated as follows: Top 10% in gender – 100 points, top 20% in gender – 99 points, top 30% in gender – 98 points etc.

**Best 6 races to count** with no more than 3 events from each category and at least 1 short, 1 medium and 1 long race. (U20: no long race required and any 4 races count)

In the event of a tie, the winner will be determined by a) Higher number of races completed, b) total points in races between the tied individuals c) Average points scored per race

### **4) Men's and Ladies "Open" Overall Points Prizes (voucher)**

Points from all races completed from the Club Road Running Championship list of races

### **5) Men's and Ladies "Open" Handicap Prizes (voucher)**

Based on performances in all races in 2026 (including races which are not part of the Club Road Running Championship). Best 4 to count. Handicap scores to be calculated from the Run Britain vSSS score for each race. To compete, runners must be registered with Run Britain ([runbritainrankings.com](http://runbritainrankings.com)) and must have competed in at least four Club Road Running Championship races. The Handicap prize should reflect the most improved runner, and, in theory, anyone can win.
